A work experience program for IEP and 504 plan students:

- Student wages are 100% funded through a grant from the California State Department of Rehabilitation (DOR)
- TCUSD applied for the WCW Grant on May 2016 and grant was awarded on July 2016
- Duration of the grand is for 1 year, July 2016 until June 2017
- Students learn to complete work applications and other work related materials
- Students are placed in appropriate workplace for 100 hours to gain valuable working experience
- Students earn minimum wages and learn to manage money
- Grades and attendance are monitored
- Coordinator submits monthly student reports to the DOR counselor
- Assistance in resume writing is provided
- Senior students are directed to college advisor or DOR counselor once jobs are completed
- File remains opened with the Department of Rehabilitation to assist in future job search and college assistance

Progress since October 2016:

- 33 Student applications have been submitted, the goal was 30 students
- 18 Students are currently working

On motion of Member Marston, seconded by Member Knollenberg, and on a 5-0 roll call vote (Aye: Bell, Goold, Knollenberg, Marston, Pomeroy; Nay: None; Abstain: None), the Board adopted Resolution 1617-16, Establishing Governing Board Member Elections to Occur on the Same Day as Statewide General Elections.

The Temple City Unified School District currently holds elections in November of odd years. Recently enacted Senate Bill 415 limits the ability of local agencies to continue holding governing board elections in odd years if the turnout for those elections is significantly less than the turnout for statewide general elections.

The turnout in recent District elections suggests that SB 415 would require the District to shift its elections to even years to avoid violating SB 415. In other words, a school district would violate SB 415 by continuing to hold odd-year elections if the voter turnout in the school district's governing board elections is at least 25 percent less than the average turnout of voters in that same district in the last four elections held in November of even years.

To comply with SB 415, Temple City Unified School District must first determine if the voter turnout is at least 25 percent less than the average turnout of voters in the last four elections held in November of even years. Based on District information and information gathered on the Registrar's website, turnout in general and Board elections has been as follows:

Enacting the guidelines of SB 415 for the upcoming 2017 election would avoid any confusion which might result from a delayed implementation. Since general elections of even years have a reduced cost for the District, there is a potential to save a significant amount of money related to election costs by aligning with a general election. The sooner the District aligns with even year general elections, the more savings would be realized. Although, the total savings is unable to be determined until six months prior to an election.

In order to shift the election it is recommended the Board adopt the resolution requesting that the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (County Board of Supervisors) move Board elections to the November election in even years. The last day for the Board to adopt such a resolution shifting the 2017 election is March 13, 2017. The request would become effective once approved by the Board of Supervisors. If/when elections are shifted forward to even years, then-current Board members would see their terms/service on the Board extended by one year.

On motion of Member Marston, seconded by Member Knollenberg, and on a 5-0 vote (Aye: Bell, Goold, Knollenberg, Marston, Pomeroy), the Board Approved the 2016 – 2017 Second Interim Financial Report.

Education Code Sections 35035(g), 42130 and 42131 require the governing board of each school district to certify at least twice a year to the district's ability to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of that fiscal year and for the subsequent two fiscal years. This is referred to as the Interim Report Process. The 2nd Interim Report is based on financial information as of January 31, 2017. It is required to be completed, Board approved and delivered to the Los Angeles County Office of Education ("LACOE") by March 15, 2017.

The certification by the Governing Board must be classified one of the following:

Positive: A school district that, based on current projections, will meet its financial obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

Approve 2016 – 2017 Second Interim Financial Report

Qualified: A school district that, based on current projections, may not meet its obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

Negative: A school district that, based on current projections, may not meet its obligations for the current and two subsequent fiscal years.

Local Control Funding Formula Projections

The District's 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2018-19 LCFF funding projections are based on information provided by LACOE and School Services of California, Inc. District projections for 2017-18 and 2018-19 include a 1.48% and 2.40% Cost of Living Adjustment ("COLA") to the Base Grant portion of the LCFF formula and assign the GAP funding portion of that formula as part of the ending fund balance for those years. The LCFF continues to provide a base grant per student (adjusted for grade span differentials, K-3, 4-6, 7-8 and 9-12) multiplied by district ADA. Additional LCFF funds are allocated to K-3 to assist in keeping class sizes small and additional funds are allocated to 9-12 to support curriculum geared to career options.

Note on Local Reserves

The 2014-15 State Budget contained controversial provisions requiring districts to substantiate the need for an unassigned or assigned ending fund balance above the required minimum reserve level beginning with budgets adopted for the 2015-16 fiscal year.

According to School Services of California, Inc. (SSC) "the First of the two major elements of the new legislation (SB 858) required additional disclosure and a public hearing related to reserve levels taking effect with the 2015-16 Budget. The second provision requires school districts to justify reserve levels to the County Office of Education. Under certain conditions, the state would require imposition of hard caps on district reserves."

SSC also noted "that the reserve limitations may never take effect

Approve 2016 – 2017 Second Interim Financial Report (continued) because of the conditions precedent to the cap on reserves. While we agree that it may be years before the limitation would be implemented, that does not relieve our concern. A law that is passed and is acceptable only because it may never take effect is, by definition unacceptable."

Retirement Rates - CalSTRS

AB 1469 increases the contribution rates that employers, employees and the state pay to support the State Teachers Retirement System. The rate for employers is 12.58% for 2016-17, up from 10.73% in 2015-16. Employer rates will continue to increase until 2020-21 and are expected to bring the underfunded retirement system to full funding in 31 years.

Retirement Rates - CalPERS

The CalPERS adjustment to district revenue limits was eliminated with the implementation of the LCFF. Therefore, any increases in the CalPERS contribution rate have direct impact on the local agency budget. The rate for employers is 13.888% for 2016-17, up from 11.847% in 2015-16. LACOE advises districts to use the rates below for multi-year projections.

This amount is in excess of the Governing Board established 5% reserve. The Gap Funding projection is \$638,416 in 2017-18 and \$2,395,078 in 2018-19.

On motion of Member Marston, seconded by Member Knollenberg, and on a 5-0 vote (Aye: Bell, Goold, Knollenberg, Marston, Pomeroy), the Board Rejected the Bid Protest Filed by Horizons Construction Co., Inc. for the Longden Elementary School Modernization Project.

Reject the bid protest filed by Horizon's Construction Company International, Inc. for the Longden Elementary School Modernization Project that the lowest bid received from Angeles Contractor, Inc. was not responsive.

On February 16, 2017, the District received five (5) bids for the Longden Elementary School Modernization Project. The lowest bid was received from Angeles Contractor, Inc. ("ACI") and the second lowest bid was received

Rejected Bid Protest Filed by Horizons Construction Co., Inc. for the Longden Elementary School Modernization Project

from Horizon's Construction Company International, Inc. ("Horizons"). Horizons filed a formal protest letter claiming that ACI's bid was not responsive.

After reviewing the protest and the response from District's legal counsel, staff recommends that the Board reject the protest for lack of merit.

On motion of Member Marston, seconded by Member Goold, and on a 5-0 vote (Aye: Bell, Goold, Knollenberg, Marston, Pomeroy), the Board Approved Agreement with Angeles Contractor, Inc. for the Longden Elementary School Modernization Project.

The project includes modernization of 23 classrooms, Administration and Media Center. Including new finishes as well as an elevator and new staff restroom including the abatement/removal of hazardous material surfaces. At 1:00 PM on February 16, 2017 a total of 5 sealed bids were received and opened;

The District and TELACU Construction Management have verified the bid document submission, conducted a Post-Bid Interview, and is ecommending the award of the contract to Angeles Contractors, Inc. as the lowest responsible bidder.

On June 15, 2015 the District issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to local and qualified inspection firms. The submission deadline for RFQ's was July 3, 2015. All RFQ's were reviewed, evaluated, and it was decided by staff that the firm(s) with the lowest hourly rate would be chosen as the District's inspection firms. The District has the option to solicit another RFP or extend the current RFP with updated fee schedules from each firm. At this time, staff believes it is in the District's best interest to use the existing RFP and pricing from 2015.

The Longden Elementary School Modernization Project has been approved by DSA. A DSA Project Inspector is required to be contracted with prior to construction commencing. This agreement will continue for 19 months. Approved
